PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD April 13th, 2025

St. Luke's Passion narrative resembles that of St. Mark but has its own emphasis. The devil who departed from Jesus after the temptations returns now, entering Judas and demanding to sift Peter. Throughout his Gospel Luke portrays Jesus as the merciful and forgiving Saviour of humankind; in death He forgives His executioners, and on the cross He brings salvation to a criminal. Typical of St. Luke is his special attention to women in a society where they were downgraded. His story is that of a disciple who relives the drama of his Master. Personal attachment to Jesus is expressed by the repeated affirmations of his innocence. He develops the personal relationships between Jesus and various characters in the tragedy, especially Judas and Peter. To understand the Passion message, we have to keep in mind the other half of Luke's two-volume work, the Acts of the Apostles. The Jesus who is accused by the chief priests before the Roman governor prepares the way for Paul being brought before the same cast of adversaries. The innocent Jesus who dies asking forgiveness for His enemies and commending His soul to God the Father prepares the way for the first Christian martyr, Stephen, who will die voicing similar sentiments.

<u>History of the Catholic Church</u> (#70) – <u>Worship, Faith, and Life in the early Church</u>. The Mass, originally called the Lord's Supper, the breaking of Bread, the Eucharist, was celebrated by the first Christians in the late afternoon and was joined with a regular meal but of ritual character. Toward the middle of the second century, however, the sacramental meal had become an independent rite and was now celebrated on Sunday morning and combined with a service of reading and preaching. Our earliest descriptions of the Mass is from the pen of St Justin Martyr (d. 165) and reflects this development. It is

a simple service consisting of prayers by the whole assembly followed by a kiss of peace. Bread and wine were then brought to the president of the assembly, who recited a long prayer of thanksgiving, all present finally consuming the bread and consecrated wine. On some occasions, the Eucharist was preceded by a reading of the prophets and memoirs of the Apostles, as well as a homily by the president. The oldest liturgical form of the Mass is found in the Church Order of Hippolytus (d. 236). It is evidently the basis of all eucharistic prayers that have since been composed
