TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME October 20th, 2024

The First Reading is an excerpt from Isaiah's fourth Servant Song. The Servant offers his life in atonement for the sins of his people. His death will be the beginning of glorification for him and be a source of blessings for others. By reflecting on passages such as this, the early Christians came to an understanding of the saving sufferings and death of Jesus. In the Gospel we see how far the Apostles are from this spirit of self-sacrifice. James and John want the top places in Jesus' Kingdom! Obviously they thought that His Kingdom would be modeled on worldly kingdoms, where those in high places enjoy honour, power, and glory. But Jesus tells them that His disciples are not to imitate the Gentiles, whose rulers lord it over people. In His Kingdom, service is what makes one great. Jesus would set the example Himself. He came "not to be served but to serve and to give His life as a ransom for many." And so authority in His Church must wear the unmistakable livery of service.

History of the Catholic Church (#46) – This canon was based on a consensus of the Church that all the books listed were associated with an apostle in some way and were orthodox in doctrine. Judgment about the authenticity of the canonical writings was based on the idea that the tradition of the Church in this matter was trustworthy in general, although it could be wrong in detail. The scholars did not accept the tradition uncritically; they did their best to verify whether the books in question were actually written by Apostles or by those in touch with them. As long as there was uncertainty about apostolic authorship, there was reluctance to accept books as canonical. Thus St. John's Gospel was not readily accepted at first, and it was only after St. Irenaeus gave what was thought sufficient proof of its authorship by St.

John that its canonicity was established. The same thing occurred with the Epistle to the Hebrews, which writers in the Western churches refused to quote for nearly two hundred years.
