## THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME October 27<sup>th</sup>, 2024

The First Reading carries a message of joyful hope for the exiles in Babylon. The Lord will save what's left of His people and bring them back from exile. Even the most helpless will share in the joy of this great event. In Mark's mind Jesus is the One who brings salvation to Israel. His healings are a sign of the coming of the Kingdom of God (Gospel). The story of Bartimaeus is as much a call story as a healing story. The expression "followed him along the way" doesn't simply mean that he joined the crowd on the road to Jerusalem. There can be no doubt what St. Mark intends: Bartimaeus followed Jesus on the way of Christian discipleship. He is presented as a model of faith. It seems that the story was used in the early Church as a model of encouragement to believers and would-be believers. Bartimaeus serves as a model for those who are spiritually blind and whose lives lack direction. Through faith they can have purpose, energy, and direction in their lives. An enthusiastic following of Jesus results in a happy and fulfilled life.

<u>History of the Catholic Church (#47)</u> – The interplay of the living Church and the written Scriptures – a constant feature of Christian history – was thus in operation from the start. The living community was constantly checked and controlled by the basic testimony of the Apostles. But at the same time, the written records were checked and controlled by the living community – as one scholar has written: "... simply because by that time it contained within it, or among its leaders, a sufficiently firm and uniform tradition to constitute it corporately a preserver of tradition..." The Canon was virtually complete by the

early decades of the second century, with such exceptions as mentioned; but it was not definitely finalized in the West until A.D. 380-90, and even later in the East.
