BAPTISM OF THE LORD January 12th, 2025

In the First Reading, the prophet (Isaiah) assures the exiles in Babylon that God is coming to save them. The prophecy was fulfilled in the return from the exile, but more especially in the coming of Jesus Christ. John the Baptist was clearly a prophet. Since the spirit of prophecy had long been absent from Israel, John's appearance raised expectations. The question arose: could he be the Messiah? But John denied that he was the Messiah, but declared that the Messiah was at hand. Thus he prepared the way for Jesus. Baptism was a defining moment in the life of Jesus – it marked the beginning of His pubic mission. St. Luke always presents Jesus as praying before making major decisions. It's no surprise then that we find Him praying during His baptism. In response to His prayers, the Holy Spirit descends on Him in bodily form at the beginning of His mission, just as it will come in visible form on the Apostles at Pentecost at the beginning of their mission. The Father puts His seal of approval on Jesus and on the mission He is about to begin.

History of the Catholic Church (#58) – The final persecution of the Church began with a devastating intellectual assault by the pagan intelligentsia led by Porphyry (d. 303). In his work Against the Christians, Porphyry held Christ up to scorn a pitiful weakling, attacked the Scriptures as full of absurdities and patent contradictions, scoffed at the Eucharist, and ridiculed the Christian works of mercy. This was the prelude to the attack launched by Diocletian, a strong and industrious ruler who had carried through a radical reorganization of the Empire; he divided it into 101 provinces and 12 dioceses, placing two co-emperors in supreme command, with imperial headquarters at Milan in the West and Nicomedia in the East.
